WORLD GAME STUDIES WORKSHOP

A one-month World Game Studies Workshop was held this summer at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, from June 24 to July 19, 1974

The aim of this international multidisciplinary workshop was to provide participants with a working understanding of what R Buckminster Fuller calls 'Comprehensive Anticipatory Design Science, the effective application of the principles of science to the conscious design of our environment

The first week introduced Design Science via an intensive schedule of lectures, seminars, films, videotapes, slides, games and discussions, with special lectures by R Buckminster Fuller, Gene Youngblood and Edwin Schlossberg Topics included global perspectives of systems analysis, technological forecasting, future studies, world resources planning and problem areas such as energy, food, shelter, etc

The next three weeks consisted of work sessions in which participants explored alternative strategies for resolving the critical problems facing the earth

SCUOLA PER GLI STUDI SUL FUTURO (School for Futures Studies) Italy's first school for futures studies, the Scuola per gli studi sul future, will begin operations October 28, 1974, in Rome, under the aegis of IRADES

The purpose of the school is to alert the student to the constant change which marks the world of today, to educate him in the choice of successive options as possibilities for confronting the future and the different future dimensions of his chosen profession, and to equip him with a knowledge of those methods which will help him cope effectively with uncertainty

The school's curriculum will offer the following instruction

- 1) a basic course,
- 2) specialized courses in methods and disciplines,
- 3) permanent conference for special and operational problems,
- 4) communications and updating procedures

Basic course

The basic course will be divided into three segments

- I Introductory Orientation from 28 October to 13 December 1974.
- ii Exploring the Future from 7 April to 30 May, 1975,
- III Application of Future StudiesOctober December 1975

This three-part basic course is designed for persons preparing to embark on any of the humanistic professions or a career in the exact sciences (statistics, mathematics, engineering, natural sciences, etc.)

The dynamic of the instruction will be formulated by teaching methods drawing upon the students' participation and creativity, with the aid of animators

Classes will revolve on three main points studies of the future, the application of various methods and the perspectives of this new approach in relation to concrete problems. Theoretical instruction will be imparted through group exercises and discussion

At the conclusion of the three-part course, the students will receive a

I Introductory Orientation

The first part of the course will give the student a general view of futures studies through a theoretical awareness, and simultaneously broaden his outlook and mentality by alerting him to the constant change characterizing the world of today and tomorrow, and his need to prepare himself for successive options Introductory Orientation is itself divided into three parts

- 1) an explication of the historical factors which have made futures studies an imperative discipline, and a descriptive panorama of the principal methods of forecasting, including their application,
- 2) a study of the man-society-nature conceptual model, which analyzes the interrelations among these three predominant systems in relation to technology by isolating selected problems,
- 3) a critical analysis of the work done thus far in the course, chiefly through group discussions and comparisons of ideas

II Exploring the Future

This course is planned to examine in depth the historical factors and me thods studied during the Introductory Orientation The student will be given opportunities to execute minor research assignments, whereby he will acquire a growing comprehension of the importance of futures studies by confronting the problems of the future and the options they involve III Application of Futures Studies

This course will explain how the principal methods of forecasting are applied and offer simulations conducted by the animators, with the participation of interdisciplinary groups

THE CULTURAL PARADIGMS PROJECT

This project has been set up by the Advanced Concept, Canadian Department of the Environment, "to obtain, organize and criticize the writan work of those assert who that a fundamental cultural transformation is occurring and/or needs to occur in Western industrialized nations. It is hoped that this project will contribute to the development of well-formed and socially responsive concepts of environmental management" The objective is "to develop a reasonably coherent view of the literature in question and, therefore, to determine the extent to which it should be attended to by Canadians and their institutions, including governments" The main outcome of the project will include

- a) a volume which reviews and comments on the literature in question,
- b) a volume which discusses the main concepts and the meta-issues of the literature, and
- c) a more publicly known list of persons and organizations who interested in and able to engage in the conceptual work bearing on fundamental issues of cultural transformation and survival

GLOBAL FUTURES GAME

The purpose of the Global Futures Game is to demonstrate graphically the problems of food resources and pollution by simulating the state of the world in terms of population, food supplies, natural and technological resources, and their relative growth Developed over the past two years by Earthrise, the game is now being used in its Futures Awareness and Futures Action worskshops, where it has met with considerable success Groups of players representing eight socio-economic world regions barter for resources in five-year rounds (each round lasting ten minutes), ending in the year 2000 There are no built-in motivations, each participant comes to the game with his own prejudices, and he can play his region as he likes The players make collective policy decisions, commit errors (reflected in world destruct points) and develop optimal strategies toward making the world viable for all humanity. Thus, those who take part acquire a realistic insight into the interrelation of global problems and the urgent need for cooperative efforts to solve them.

The game can be played by from eight to 48 persons, and lasts for two hours

- Major catastrophes or "catalytic crises" (moving the human race to collective action) in the next decade
- Needed "catalytic analysis" and "councils of urgent studies" to initiate self-amplifying ideas and institutions to cope with these crises and make use of them for education
- Possibility of major global changes in organization, with new world management structures e g in food stockpiles, ocean pollution, resources allocation, development funds for LDC's, trade and communications and arms control by 1985
- Need for a "World Survival Movement" to achieve unity, cohesion and parallel action in solving problems on many levels and in many places, and in building new much-needed institutions
